BRITISH SIMMENTAL PEDIGREE REGISTRATIONS AND SALES INCREASE FOR A SECOND CONSECUTIVE YEAR

• Official Simmental Society Sales in the Year Gross £2,091,406, up by £87,479

he upsurge in performance for British Simmental has seen pedigree registrations and birth notifications increase for a second year in a row. In the figures released by the British Simmental Cattle Society for the pedigree registration year of 1st August 2022 to 31st July 2023, the overall total was 7633 up by 245 and representative of a 3.3% increase.

Going hand in hand with these figures another strong year of Official Society Pedigree Simmental in the same period has seen a sales gross of £2,091,406, up by £87,479 (4.35%) on the year. The strong sales demand for both bulls and females saw a number of new breed record marks set in the year and including at Stirling, Carlisle, and Aberdeen. The sales at Stirling in May 2022, October 2022, and February 2023, all saw breed record averages attained for these fixtures. Stirling in February 2023 was the highest grossing sale with 97 bulls averaging a new February record of £7,260, up £425 on the year. The sale in October at Stirling saw a new Simmental breed record allsale average of £7,559 for 45 bulls, up by £1,597 on the year, and up by £734 on the previous sale record mark. At the second staging of the establishing Next Generation Sale of Females & Weaned Calves at Carlisle in December a top price



of 18,000gns was attained, with heifer averages of £5202, up by £806 on the year. Both the top price and heifer average were new breed centre records.

This further increase in pedigree registrations, combined with the demand at the point of sale was again welcomed by the Society's President Norman Robson, Kilbride Farm, Ballyclare who said: "There's a real forward industry emphasis by beef producers on the efficiencies and value that Simmental genetics can deliver.

The Simmental's benchmark is their milk fertility, calving ease, temperament, and abilities to rear a fast-growing calf without creep feeding. Add in that AHDB data continues to show the breed as the number one continental breed for age at slaughter, and it just collectively highlights that adding Simmental genetics gives you super maternal performance and top-class carcass traits."

Commenting further he went on to say: "In the course of the year we conducted a wide-ranging survey of Simmental bull buyers, and we were delighted that the breed received a 94% approval rate from

commercial buyers who confirmed that they would purchase further Simmental bulls. I'd like to congratulate breeders for the quality of stock they are bringing forward and would urge everyone to keep placing an emphasis on breeding selection and improvement."

The next pedigree sales under the Society's auspices will be the 2023 Stirling Sale on Monday October 23rd that sees 122 Simmental bulls entered from breeders. Following the bull sale on the same day will be the Complete Dispersal Sale (due to retirement) of the noted Heathbrow Polled Simmental herd, of David & Lesley Sapsed, High Heath Farm, Codicote, Hitchin, Herts.

ELEVEN-YEAR-OLD VALE ROYAL ANNIE WINS 2023 VIRTUAL SHOW

• Kilbride Farm Jetstream is Overall Reserve

fter some six weeks of online judging through July and August, and with 431 animals entered from 81 pedigree breeders all over the United Kingdom, the 2023 Simmental Virtual Show Championship has been won by the eleven-year-old cow Vale Royal Annie from James Arnold, Tarporley, Cheshire. Mr Arnold has now won this fledgling but high-profile competition, the UK's largest online pedigree show, twice in its four-year history having won the inaugural event with Vale Royal Heavenly Girlie in 2020. This year's event has seen 431 animals entered over the six classes, up by 145 on last year.

Vale Royal Annie initially prevailed from a tremendous class of 92 Cows-in-milk, judged by Bridget Olds of the Bosahan herd, Falmouth, Cornwall, before securing the Female Championship from the section judge John Barlow of the Denizes herd, Nr Leyland, Lancs. In the Supreme Championship, judged by David Lowry of the noted Keeldrum Herd, Newsteadings Farm, Lanark, she went headto-head with the Male Champion Kilbride Farm Jetstream 18 (P) from WH Robson & Sons, Doagh, Ballyclare, before duly being announced as the winner.

Commenting, David Lowry said: Vale Royal Annie is just a tremendous example of the Simmental breed. She's eleven-years-old and in the picture she just retains such a freshness, and is full of breed character and femininity. Annie has an excellent top line on her, lovely balanced body, a tremendous udder for her age and looks to be standing on a good set of legs. With nine calves to her name she's also a terrific example of the longevity that is typical of Simmental females and I think she's a very worthy Supreme Champion."

CORSKIE NUTMEG SOLD IN PRIVATE DEAL FOR £32,000 TO THE DENIZES HERD

orskie Nutmeg, the January 2022 born Simmental bull from WJ & J Green, Corskie, Garmouth, Fochabers has been sold privately for £32,000 to the Denizes herd of MA Barlow & Sons, Ulnes, Nr Leyland, Lancashire. At this year's Royal Highland Show in June, Corskie Nutmeg put himself firmly in the shop window when winning the Simmental Junior Male Championship; Reserve Overall Male; and Reserve Overall Junior; and before going on to win Reserve Overall in the Beefbreeder Interbreed. Immediately catching the ring side eye of John Barlow, an approach to the Green family was made and after a few days discussion and consideration the deal was done. Beyond heading home to Corskie and passing all the usual tests, the bull was picked up in mid-August and has now joined the 80-cow pedigree Denizes Simmental herd in Lancashire."

The £32,000 price is the second highest paid for a Simmental bull in the UK and sitting only sitting behind the 45,000gns the Greens themselves paid for Bel Dhu Capercaillie at Stirling back in February 2013. With a breeding connectivity, Capercaillie is the sire of Corksie Nutmeg's dam, Corskie Jasmine EX92.

Commenting on the purchase John Barlow said, "We didn't go to the Highland with a view to looking for a bull but Corskie Nutmeg just had that x-factor and we couldn't miss the opportunity. Dad (Michael) and I moved quickly for him because he has everything we look for in a Simmental stock bull and with his quality we knew there had to be a lot of interest in him! Nutmeg's got length, power, muscle, and with a real sweetness and style. He comes from a foremost herd with proven cow families, has a real depth on both sides of his pedigree, and has top performance indexes. We have Denizes Hamish, Saltire Impressive, and Coose Gambler as stock bulls and all bringing something different to the herd. Nutmeg adds to that and we're excited about the prospect of him clicking with these other lines."

Corskie Nutmeg is sired by the herd's stock bull Kilbride Farm Haka who the Greens purchased for 10,000gns at Stirling in 2018. To see the full press release then please visit www.britishsimmental.co.uk

Heathbrow Polled Simmentals

FEMALE FAMILIES KEY TO HEATHBROW SIMMENTAL HERD'S SUCCESS

The Heathbrow Simmental herd has had tremendous show and sale success, with its progeny also influencing many other herds. On 23rd October at United Auctions, Stirling, this noted herd will hold a Complete Dispersal Sale after some 28 years of pedigree breeding. Please see the Heathbrow herd feature here which was first printed in the Farmers Guardian and is reprinted with their kind permission.

Which is wife Lesley, at Codicote, Hertfordshire, knew that focusing on maternal traits was essential when establishing a pedigree beef herd & it is that to which he attributes much of the herd's success.

Mr Sapsed's father took on the running of High Heath Farm from his father in 1948, on the promise that he would keep milking cows there. Mr Sapsed explains: "My grandfather had taken on the tenancy of the farm on Viscount Hampden's Hoo Estate in 1943, rent-free for the first five years, because it was known as 'the worst farm in Hertfordshire for soil type' & the previous three tenants had gone broke. But he believed that by milking cows and putting the muck back on to the land it could be improved." Mr Sapsed was given the opportunity to take on the farm in his own right in 1975 at the age of 23 when his father moved to a bigger arable farm. By that time, it had been acquired by Oxford University, which is still the current landlord and comprised of 117 hectares (290 acres) & 50 dairy cows. He says: "At that time the cows were British Friesians, but I moved to Holsteins, used Canadian bulls by AI & built the herd up to 120-140 cows, which were producing 8,000 to 9,000 litres annually from three-times-a-day milking – which was a lot in those days.

"We had our first reduction sale in 1988, which was very successful with 68 animals sold to Ireland, France & Italy. It just proved that

focusing on pedigrees had paid off. But it was a difficult time for dairying. Bank rates were against us and milk quota leasing was very expensive, so we took the decision to get out of dairy. So in 1993, all the youngstock were sold at Crewe market and the cows as a herd in one private transaction."

Following the dispersal of the dairy herd, the decision was taken to establish a pedigree beef herd, but the question was 'which breed'. Mr Sapsed says: "We experimented with a number of breeds, including Hereford, Simmental, Limousin and Charolais crosses, by rearing calves right through to heifer calving themselves. Simmentals came out top for everything, particularly milk and growth an that really made our minds up."

Four heifers were bought from the Borlase family's Sacombe herd as foundation females and the commercial cows were gradually phased out. In a move to differentiate their newly formed Heathbrow herd from the majority of others and to give stock an additional selling point, it was decided to go down the polled route. The polled yearling heifer, AWL Starlet, which was blonde in colour was imported from Canada where she had to spend six months in quarantine before shipping. Starlet proved to be very influential in the herd as well as a big winner in the show ring.

Mr Sapsed says: "She was bought from A W Londry, who was ahead of his time & very much a pioneer in cattle breeding in Canada. Starlet won three breeding championships in her first season showing & then we brought her out again nine years later & she won three inter-breeds & six breed championships. We never flushed her, but she bred extremely well, always producing polled bulls. She was very much the head of the herd and was put to sleep just before her 21st birthday, but there are still 19 of her descendants here today."

The bull, Hockenhull Kramer, was bought in October 2000 after being champion at Perth bull sales and several other females from well-known herds have been bought over the years. In 2006, the heifer Darsham Real Treasure was bought for 13,000gns at the herd dispersal sale at Stirling. She was a daughter of one of the breed's most successful females & winner of numerous Royal championships, Darsham Kit Kat, & went on to produce Heathbrow Ex-Factor, which won numerous championships.

Three heifers were bought from Finlay McGowan's Dirnanean herd – Sarah, Sybil & Kitty – all of which bred very well. Sarah won several breed championships and was dam of Diamond, a junior national champion, and the granddam of the bull, Heathbrow Important, which won four inter-breed titles and was European Simmental of the Year and Reserve Simmental world champion in 2020. Heathbrow Important was sold privately to the Blackford herd, Inverness, but the Sapseds continued to use him by Al & he has now returned to Heathbrow.

Sybil produced Duchess, a national champion, and Kitty won five inter-breeds & was national champion in 2013. Mr Sapsed says: "We have always focused on having good families as they will always rise to the top. We have kept the best females & continually culled out

the bottom end to keep improving the herd. We do use Breedplan as a management tool and when selling stock. The younger generation particularly want to see figures, but it is also important to use your eyes.

Temperament is also paramount, as are good udders – we do not keep any females which do not milk. Longevity is often overlooked. We have a number of cows in the herd more than 10 years old. If your cows last longer you will have more heifers to sell."

Stock bulls have included Dirnanean Welcome by Starline Nelson, bought in 2010, & Celtic Comet, who was injured & left limited progeny.

The horned bull, Scotland Hill Cairo, was bought to inject some stature into the herd and his progeny included the bulls Jaguar Juggernaut, who went to Germany, as well as successful females.

More recent purchases have been the polled bull Blackford Kirk, and also Kilbride Farm Morikawa, in partnership with Tom Hill.

More than 200 pedigree bulls have been sold over the years, the majority of which have been private sales. Mr Sapsed says: "We have sold nine bulls this year just by word of mouth. We have a lot of repeat customers and shows are a great way of advertising stock. We have also helped a number of people set up pedigree herds by selling them female foundation stock and it is nice to follow their progress."

Mr & Mrs Sapsed now farm 234ha (600 acres) at High Heath along with contract farming a further 283Ha (700 acres) of arable land on the Knebworth Estate in partnership with Mr Sapsed's nephew, Peter. They employ Kevin Jenkins, who has been with them for 40 years, and some part-time staff, with Mr Jenkins doing all the arable work allowing Mr & Mrs Sapsed to focus on the cattle.

Mr Sapsed says: "Although it has improved since the early days, the farmland is very light. Most of the grassland is unploughable as it is an ex-gravel pit which was not top soiled or levelled properly. We always grew maize for the dairy cows, which was quite unusual then and lucerne, which we have continued with. The poorer the land, the better for lucerne, as it needs no fertiliser apart from a bit of potash δ it keeps going in a drought. We rotate it round the arable land and it can be difficult to establish, but can last for about five years, with the second crop of wheat after lucerne generally doing the best. The lucerne is cut three times a year, round baled δ fed to the cattle which do very well on it. Youngstock also get a home-grown mix, but we do not include any protein in it as lucerne is high in protein."

Recent triumphs for the herd include taking the Male Championship at the Great Yorkshire Show with Heathbrow Nationwide, and the Overall Interbreed Junior Championship with the heifer Heathbrow Natasha.

In spite of this ongoing success, the couple have taken the difficult decision to disperse the herd, which will be going under the hammer at Stirling in October. Mr Sapsed says: "We have had tremendous fun breeding and showing cattle, and thoroughly enjoy the social side. But we now have 11 grandchildren and we want to have more time to be able to see, support and encourage them in what they are doing, as well as taking more holidays. We do not have a stockman here, we relied on help from freelance stockpersons at shows, including Brenda Hide, Paul Walker, Richard Davies and Ashley & Scott McInnes, for which we are very grateful. Kevin can manage the arable side & having no cattle will enable us to do other things."
